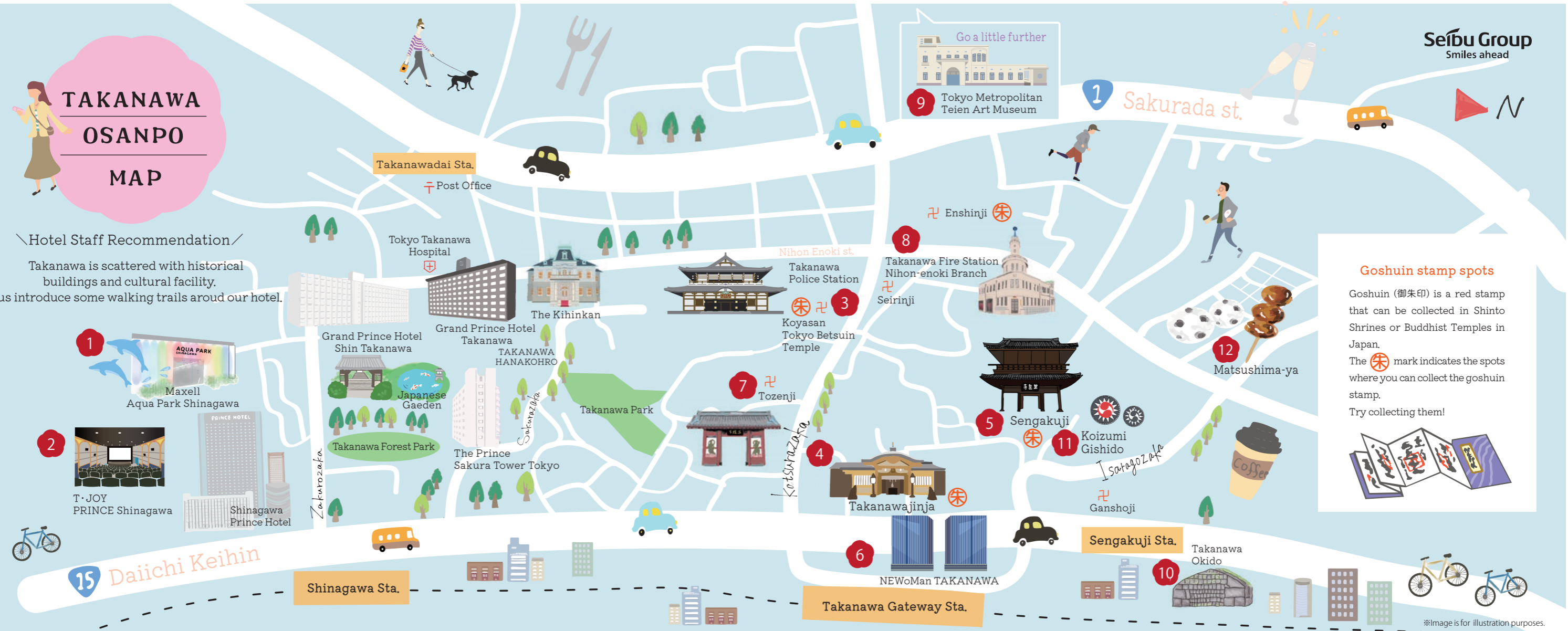


# TAKANAWA OSANPO MAP

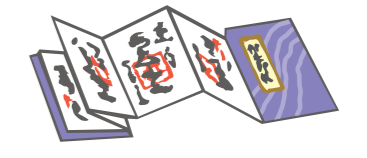
## Hotel Staff Recommendation

Takanawa is scattered with historical buildings and cultural facility. Let us introduce some walking trails around our hotel.



## Goshuin stamp spots

Goshuin (御朱印) is a red stamp that can be collected in Shinto Shrines or Buddhist Temples in Japan. The 卍 mark indicates the spots where you can collect the goshuin stamp. Try collecting them!

**1** Maxell Aqua Park Shinagawa

About 2 minutes on foot from Shinagawa Station. The most advanced entertainment in Tokyo, conveying the fascination of living creatures through a variety of performances. An urban aquarium that delivers the charm of the sea world in a space that makes full use of digital technology.

**2** T·JOY PRINCE Shinagawa

An 11-screen movie theater where you can relax and enjoy a wide variety of movies. Immerse yourself in your favorite movie at a large-screen theater space.

**3** Koyasan Tokyo Betsuin Temple

This is a branch temple of the Koyasan Shingon Sect main temple, Kongobu-ji. In the Keicho era, it was established as the workplace of the scholarly monks, Homon and Jumon of the Mount Koya.

**4** Takanawajinja

Takanawajinja was built in the middle of the Muromachi period and has 500 years of history. In the precinct, there is "Taishi-Gu", where Prince Shotoku is enshrined.

**5** Sengakuji

A Soto Zen temple built in Sotosakurada in 1612. It was rebuilt in the current Takanawa area by Tokugawa Iemitsu, the third shogun. It is a famous place for visiting the grave of Ako Gishi. Since its foundation, it has been equipped with Shichido Garan, and is known as one of the three principle temples of Edo and is one of the Sangakuryo.

**6** Takanawa Gateway Station

This station opened in March 2020, which can be accessed by JR Yamanote Line and Keihin-Tohoku Line. The symbolic large white roof is based on Origami, the traditional Japanese art. The high ceiling and large glasses help create a space where the station and the city can be felt as one.

**7** Tozenji

Tozenji Temple was used as a diplomatic residence by the first British diplomatic envoy to Japan, Sir John Rutherford Alcock, and his successor, Sir Harry Smith Parkes. Although it was attacked by the Joi sect several times, the inner study and the entrance remain as they were at that time.

**8** Takanawa Fire Station Nihon-enoki Branch

The Takanawa fire station Nihon-enoki branch, facing the Takanawa Police Station intersection, was completed in December 28, 1933. It has been designated as a preserved building by the Tokyo cultural design project for its modern German Expressionist architecture. It is possible to visit the inside of the building.

**9** Tokyo Metropolitan Teien Art Museum

The Tokyo Metropolitan Teien Art Museum building, a spectacular feat of Art Deco design, was completed in 1933 as the residence of Prince Asaka.

**10** Takanawa Okido

In 1710, stone walls were built on both sides of the Tokaido to maintain public order in Edo. In contrast with the town gates found in each town, the gate protected entirety of Edo. This gate is called Okido, and the place was bustling with travelers and their visitors.

**11** Koizumi Gishido

A long-established souvenir shop with over 100 years of history. It is located in front of the gate of Sengakuji Temple. They handle items and souvenirs related to Chushingura. There are also items related to Jindaiko, a drum that was used by Oishi Kuranosuke as a signal to demand 47 warriors to attack the Kira residence.

**12** Matsushima-ya

A long-established wagashi shop (Japanese confectionery shop) founded in 1918. Matsushima-ya is known as one of Tokyo's top three bean daifuku. Its Mame Daifuku are salty and have preserved their traditional flavor. Mitarashi dango is so popular that they sold out within 30 minutes.
